Sport Funding 2022 - 2023

At Sherston Primary School, we recognise the importance of Physical Education (PE) in helping to ensure good health and the well-being of our children. We believe that a varied PE curriculum and the provision of extra-curricular opportunities can have a positive influence on the concentration, attitude and academic achievement of all our children.

The Primary School Sports Funding will enable us to continue and extend our provision through employing additional sports professionals to work alongside and develop skills in our teachers, by providing opportunities for all Key stage 1 and 2 pupils to take part in competitive sports competitions and increasing participation in sport.

What is Sport Funding?

The government have committed to spending over £450 million on improving PE and sport provision in Primary Schools since the academic year 2013-2014. This funding is allocated directly to schools to enable them to raise the standards of PE provision and to help pupils achieve sporting success. Each school receives £16000 per year plus £10 per pupil in Y1 to Y6. This means that Sherston Primary School received £17,130 for the academic year 2022/2023. We also had a small carry forward from last year which brought our total to £17,427

This money must be spent on improving the provision of PE and sports within schools but Head teachers have the freedom to choose how they do this.

Some possible uses of the funding include:

- Hiring specialist PE teachers or qualified sports coaches to work alongside primary teachers.
- Paying for professional development opportunities in PE/sport
- Providing cover to release primary teachers for professional development in PE/sport
- Running sport competitions, or increasing participation in the school games
- Buying quality assured professional development modules or material for PE/sport
- Providing places for pupils on after school sport clubs and residential visits
- Procurement of new resources particularly games equipment
- Provision of effective, accessible outside storage

It is expected that schools will see an improvement against the **following 5 key indicators:**

Key indicator 1: The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – Chief Medical Officer guidelines recommend that primary school pupils undertake at least 30 minutes of physical activity a day in school

Key indicator 2: The profile of PESSPA (Physical Education School Sport and Physical Activity) being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement

Key indicator 3: Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport

Key indicator 4: Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils

Key indicator 5: Increased participation in competitive sport

In addition to this, children must meet the end of Key Stage 2 swimming requirements:

- Swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres
- Use a range of strokes effectively
- Perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations

(Swimming funding does NOT come from the Sports premium budget, however it may be used to support those children struggling to meet the requirements after completing swimming classes in year 3.)

More detail on specific areas of PESSPA:

PE Hub Membership

The PE Hub membership provides comprehensive and extensive schemes of work and lesson plans in PE from YR to Y6. There is also an assessment tool which links to the scheme of work. This ensures progress can be measured effectively across the school.

The impact of this membership has meant that teachers are able to ensure that they are effectively covering all the objectives of the curriculum. It also provides guidance for teachers in areas of PE that they may otherwise feel less confident in teaching. In turn this ensures that the children receive a well round education in PE and all make progress with physical literacy skills.

Avon Teaching Schools Alliance/Malmesbury School Sports Coordinator (SSCo)

The PE department of Malmesbury Secondary School work with a number of primary schools throughout the year with the intention to provide CPD opportunities for primary school staff as well as allowing pupils to experience a range of new and exciting sports and activities.

The bulk of our tournaments and festivals are organised through the SSSCo in partnership with the Avon Teaching Schools Alliance. Our children have enjoyed much success in these tournaments.

The SSSCo organises a Play Leaders training scheme for year 6 students, who develop the skills to encourage younger children to participate in small games and activities which they organise during the lunchtime breaks.

Funding for the SSSCo is shared by all the participating feeder schools in our cluster.

The impact of this cluster membership has meant that the school has been able to compete in a wide range of sports festivals. This has raised the profile of sport amongst the children and has enabled them to experience success through competitive sport. Staff are also made aware of available CPD opportunities and where appropriate attend these.
